

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INTRODUCTION

The City of Thousand Oaks has conducted a community Attitude Survey every five years since 1969 to sample citizen views on a wide range of planning and other community issues. The value of the Survey has been two-fold: First, as a gauge of City performance in a number of areas; and second, as a reference for the City Council and other agencies in determining priorities for the future. The 2004 Survey is the eighth conducted during the past 40 years.

From survey to survey, the questions are kept as consistent as possible in order to observe trends over time in community values and opinions. Nevertheless, during a five-year period, some new issues arise as others lose their importance or relevance. These are reflected in changes to the questionnaire.

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METHODOLOGY

The survey questionnaire was mailed to 11,889 households, a 25 percent sample of all households in the Thousand Oaks Planning Area, which includes Newbury Park, Thousand Oaks and the Ventura County portion of Westlake Village. A copy of the survey questionnaire is attached in Section 3.

The household sample was randomly selected by two methods:

- 1. The City's main computer selected every fourth household from the master land file which includes residential addresses for all single family, townhouse, condominium and mobile home residences.
- Apartments are not included in the master land file, so a 25 percent sample of apartment households was selected at random by an independent mailing service.

The survey questionnaire was prepared and printed by the City. It was mailed by presorted bulk mail with a first class business reply envelope included for return of the survey, at no cost to the respondent. The surveys were mailed on May 13, 2004. Respondents were asked to return their completed surveys by May 27, 2004, although late returns were accepted and included in the final results. The results were compiled from 3,190 returned surveys, which represents a 26.8 percent response rate. This is considered a good response rate due to the length and complexity of the survey questionnaire. For comparison purposes, prior survey response rates were as follows: 30% in 1999; 27% in 1994; 37% in 1989; 29% in 1984; and 37% in 1979.

Five data-entry personnel entered each survey individually into the City's main computer. Each entry was crosschecked to verify data accuracy. The data entry process took just under three weeks to complete.

The cost of the survey was approximately \$15,200. It included paper, envelopes, printing, binding, folding, postage (outgoing and return), and data entry.

METHODOLOGY CONTINUED

Please note that after the survey was mailed, it was discovered that Question 11, Item #8 (Grading in hillside areas), lacked the appropriate row of response boxes. Over 700 respondents compensated for the error by placing a mark in the blank line opposite Item #8 (Grading in hillside areas) under one of the appropriate columns (e.g. Very Satisfied, Generally Satisfied, Neutral, etc.). The stated results for this item are, therefore, based on a smaller sample size but are deemed valid because of the large sample size for the survey as a whole. The majority of other respondents left Item #8 blank but responded to the other items in Question 11. This error did not appear to affect responses to the other items after item 8 in Question 11. Survey results for these items appear consistent with the 1999 survey results. The 2004 survey results for these items are considered valid as representing the general sentiments of respondents on these items.

SECTION 1

2004 SURVEY RESULTS

The following survey results are presented in percentages. For Questions 6 and 7 the circled number indicates the ranking of the top ten items selected. In some cases the percentages for individual responses to a question add up to more than 100%. This occurred when an individual provided more than one response to a question. Question 47 (location of employment) seemed to have the greatest degree of multiple responses.
